- Pencil sales—If your school has a small pencil vending machine, put all sorts of fun pencils in the machine. Kids pay \$.50 for each one. Use the collected money for an author visit.

- Uniform-free day—At some schools, students are required to wear uniforms. Give each student the option of having a uniform-free day for a fee of \$5. Fund the author visit with that money.
- Solicit local businesses/BBB for donations. Connect with local businesses, bookstores, and public libraries to see what resources they can provide or if they want to partner with you. - PTA
- Bundle with another school or public library (share full-day Author Visit expenses with another school or library within driving distance).
- "In-house" field trip for organizations seeking to fund activities
- Local chapter of Society of Children's Book Writers & Illustrators contact for ideas
- Read-a-Thon or Write-a-Thon with sponsors
- Add "Author Visit" to your wish list for your classroom or on your website
- Use book sales to fund author visits (purchase books at reduced prices, sell at regular prices, use funds to pay for author visits)
- Spare change/penny drive
- Title 1 funds
- Book sale, bake sale, car wash, book fairs, birthday books
- Crowd source funding, like Kickstarter, Greg Pincus on Alternative Funding Options for Author Visits

- Author deals ask if the author will give you a discount if you help rustle up other Author Visits in your area during the same time
- Organizations donate books to a certain population, then the author speaks pro bono (University Academy in KC, Reach Out and Read KC, etc)
- Check with Arts Foundations to see if they sponsor artists and/or the underprivileged
- Utilize <u>donorschoose.org</u>. One of my recent school visits was paid for through <u>donorschoose.org</u>. The library media specialist posted lots of pictures after the event so the donors were able to see their donated dollars in action.
- Ask a local hotel to donate a room for the visiting author.
